Thursday 14th September marked our prestigious annual Presentation and Graduation Evening, where we celebrate effort, ethos and success across the school.



Curriculum Subject Focus: RE

This year marks the introduction of the new Religious Education Directory (RED) in our curriculum, beginning with Year 7 students. This revised programme is structured to provide a comprehensive understanding of various aspects of religious education, which will be expanded to Years 8 and 9 in subsequent years, aiming for complete Key Stage 3 implementation by September 2025.

The curriculum for Year 7 begins with the unit titled 'Creation and Covenant.' This unit is designed to give students insights into the teachings on creation from the Book of Genesis, supported by the Catholic Church's perspective on scientific explanations of the origins of the universe. It offers a balanced view, aiming to educate students on both religious and scientific fronts.

Our vision is to create an inclusive community where students can explore spirituality and engage in self-reflection. We aim to enhance students' critical thinking, religious iteracy, and achieve ocademic excellence. We enable students to faster a profound sense of belonging, ensuring that everyone, regardless of background, finds a welcoming place to grow and thrive.



Each unit in the RED is examined through four lenses: Bible, Belief, Celebrate and Lived Religion. This approach ensures that students gain a well-rounded view of the topics covered, encouraging a deeper engagement with the content. This allows students of all faiths and none to explore and reflect on the material based on their individual beliefs and perspectives. Furthermore, students will have the opportunity to explore beliefs and practices of other Christian denominations as well as various world religions.

As we begin this academic journey with the RED, we are committed to providing a learning experience that is both educational and respectful of diverse beliefs and opinions, promoting an environment of mutual respect and understanding. This is in line with our departmental vision, as shared above.



Year 9 French Trip

After a rough ferry crossing, we were very grateful for the peaceful coach journey to the beautiful Château de la Baudonnière and the delicious hot chocolate that was waiting for us on our arrival.

Sixth Form Work Experience Week

The last week of the summer term saw all our Year 12 students on their work experience placements which they prepared for as part of their careers and skills sessions. We were delighted that the year group succeeded in finding some really great placements which not only gave them a taste of the world of work but also helped them to develop soft skills such as punctuality, taking and following instructions and working with new people in a team environment.

Student placements included some well-known companies such as NatWest Bank, Coca Cola, British Airways and the Royal Surrey County Hospital. Whilst some students remained in the area, others travelled to London or beyond, giving them a real idea of what it is like to be a commuter.

As part of her work experience week, Orla attended the Young Professionals Careers Festival at the QE2 Conference Centre, Westminster where she took part in workshops held by some wellknown global companies. Diego enjoyed a week at the INV group, where he was invited to contribute to the daily inhouse feedback meetings. As a complete contrast, Alfie spent his week at Arundel Castle, where he helped with the tour groups as well as learning more about the castle. Alfie even volunteered to dress in a suit of armour!

Following their placements, all the students received feedback as well as completing a careers and skills module which reflected on their week.

One student noted "I have found myself continually using skills learned at my placement for all my A Level work and found them to be very valuable and time saving! I also improved my typing skills greatly and coming in to see the office was a very interesting experience. I also learned a lot about workplace expectations and courtesy. The virtual meetings I attended with



the US offices were definitely the highlight of my experience and I loved the brainstorming meetings."

Another student commented "I left the week with many transferable skills that I can take forward. I believe the most important skill I

learned was how to work as a team in a professional environment. Being able to work with several different people in different sectors really gave me an insight into how different jobs require different personal skills."

The heart-warming feedback from employers demonstrates that our students not only chose their placements well, but also applied themselves diligently and enthusiastically. Many students have been offered part-time jobs following their work experience week and one has been offered an apprenticeship.



Keep Young People Stay Safe - Online Safety

Following our Online Safety Evening, below are a few top tips for keeping young people safe online.

Downtime

Teenagers need sleep and relaxation to ensure they are able to function properly at school. According to the NHS, 68% of teenagers do not get enough sleep during the school week and much of this is to do with phones and devices.

There are settings on all phones called "Downtime" which stops young people using these. Also consider other devices in bedrooms. How can you ensure these are not being used overnight? Do plugs or controllers from games consoles need to be removed? Perhaps mobile phones could be charged in a communal area overnight?

Time limits

Most phones and tablets have the ability to limit time on specific apps and it is really useful to apply these limits. You can also add specific websites if your child uses a website a lot e.g. Minecraft, COD or FIFA. You can change these for school days and weekends by customising the days, if this is relevant to your family and your child.

Monitoring

There are a huge number of monitoring apps and it is useful to have these in place. This website reviews several of them and is a useful starting point if you do not have monitoring in place currently: <u>https://www.safetydetectives.</u> <u>com/best-parental-control/</u>

Gaming

Check age restrictions and content on all games your child is playing. Remember, it is not just about the content of the game, but the ages of the people playing it. If the game is an 18, the chat will no doubt reflect more adult content and many of our Year 7s reported being in chats where homophobia, racism and sexism was rife. Most chat functions can be shut down or limited to a few friends rather than chatting to random people around the world.

Reporting

Know how to block people on any apps/games/websites your child is using so you can help them if needed. Make sure your child knows how to report anything that makes them uncomfortable:

During the day, we worked alongside the Chichester Harbour Conservancy Education Team and students used a range of fieldwork techniques to investigate how the beach is changing and how it is being managed. This allowed our Year

11 students to reinforce their coastal classroom learning and to see 'real life' geography.

Our students were impeccably behaved and their enthusiasm was of the highest level. The sun shone, the challenging questions were answered, fieldwork skills were exceptional and the pride flowed.

GCSE Results 2023

Just in case you missed this article in August!

We are proud to announce that the St Peter's community has been celebrating outstanding GCSE results again. Many staff shared in the moment when the envelopes were opened and seeing the delight of the students' achievements and the affirmation of all their hard work over the last two years.

In fact, the school results are excellent and are better than our attainment in summer 2019 which is where nationally results are most closely aligned. 92% of students gained five GCSEs at grade 4 or above and 85% gained five GCSEs at grade 5 or above. 55% of all entries are grades 9-7.



We would like to pay tribute to all our staff who supported the students throughout the last five years, to the parents who have shared the anxiety and pressure whilst trying to remain calm but especially to the students and their fabulous talents and sheer hard work that enabled them to be awarded the grades they deserved.

It has been a delight to welcome our students back into St Peter's Sixth Form in September and see them start the next stage of their journey.





A Level Results 2023

Congratulations to all our Year 13 students! We are incredibly proud of all they have achieved, especially considering that this was the first round of public examinations this group had ever sat due to the pandemic. They showed perseverance and resilience across the two years of their A Level and BTEC studies.

As the government announced,

schools have seen a return to prepandemic results in 2019. We are pleased to say that St Peter's has slightly increased our attainment from 2019. Our final grades are as follows:

- 45% A*- A
- 73% A*- B
- 90% A*- C

• 46% of our students are going on to Russell Group universities from those that applied.



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Chaplaincy Update

On 4th October, our Year 8 leaders represented the school for the Annual Diocesan Schools Pilgrimage. Led by Bishop Richard, we began at the bottom of town, walking past Arundel Castle and through its estate to the Cathedral where we celebrated Mass.

As it was the Feast of St Francis of Assisi, we were encouraged to reflect on the gift of creation, stopping to appreciate our surroundings and take photos of what inspired us. At midday, Pope Francis issued Laudate Deum, with the Bishop's homily reflecting on its message, inviting us to pray and act on the climate crisis and its impact on the poorest in the world.

UCAS Update

September saw us bid farewell to our 2023 cohort of A Level students, who are moving onto the next phase of their educations and into their adult lives. The sheer variety of options open to them is staggering: students are starting degrees in all manner of fields, taking on high-profile

degree apprenticeships with some of the largest companies in the world, and embarking on gap-year activities that will take some of them across the globe. I look forward to working with some of the gapyear students again when they start their own UCAS application process in 2024.

We are particularly proud of this year group's ambition,



determination and resilience. As the first year group since the 2019 cohort to face the full spectrum of A Level and BTEC exams with no concessions to COVID, they have faced more challenges than many – and yet, in the face of tightening grade boundaries,

> they have managed to deliver an astonishing set of results that has seen 46% of university applicants secure places in Russell Group universities, and five students gain places at Cambridge University.

Business Day Students had a fantastic day visiting two different businesses, finding out about different careers and progression routes. They met employees and took part in activities so that they could experience what the work was like.






Literacy Focus

Excitingly, this half term Sparx Reader has been launched in Year 7. Sparx Reader is a reading, comprehension and vocabulary programme that encourages students to read regularly to help improve their literacy and love of reading. Sparx Reader homework provides a highly personalised weekly reading homework for students, tailored to their reading ability. Students can choose from a range of eBooks at their appropriate

level and as they read, they will answer questions to check they are reading carefully. Readers earn points meaning they can track their progress and climb the league table.





We are looking forward to: seeing how Year 7 engage with the programme; watching their literary progression and to awarding half termly book prizes to our top readers.

A way to help support your child, regardless of year group, with reading for pleasure, is to use the PEER Framework. This framework is a simple sequence that can be used to promote discussions around reading:

- Prompt your child to say something about the book.
- Evaluate their response.
- Expand their response by adding information to it.

• Repeat the prompt to help them learn from the expansion.
