Holocaust Memorial Day Talk

On 18th January, our school organised an unforgettable event featuring Beatrice, a survivor of the Holocaust, who generously shared her impactful life story with us. We learned about her challenging journey, from authorities attempting to send her back to Poland to the unsettling encounter with SS officers who gave her family a mere week to vacate. Beatrice vividly described their subsequent escape to Naples and eventual refuge in England, braving the dangers of the Blitz and finding shelter in underground spaces.

Despite numerous setbacks and rejections throughout her life, Beatrice and her family displayed incredible resilience, triumphing over formidable challenges. The event offered our school community a unique chance to interact directly with Beatrice,



enabling us to pose questions that delved into the profound depths of her experiences. Personally, I inquired about her faith, wondering if it had ever wavered after enduring such hardships. Her resolute response to the negative was inspiring. The privilege of shaking hands with Beatrice was a powerful moment, a tangible link to history that dispelled any doubts about the Holocaust's reality. Her presence underscored the strength of the human spirit and emphasised the importance of preserving and learning from the lessons of the past.

'Coccus Pocus' 2023 Clean Sweep!

After last year's success with a winner of the 'Coccus Pocus' Science Creative Writing competition coming from St Peter's, once again, our students took the opportunity to impress a panel of judges. The level of creativity in our students' writing has been outstanding. We have been very proud to see the enthusiasm towards this competition and hopefully as a result this may pique their interest in 'bigger picture' science and careers, in this case specifically, Microbiology.

The contestants were encouraged to write a short horror or sci-fi story between 500 and 2,000 words, including themes of antimicrobial resistance and/or microbial biofilms (bacterial layers). The evaluation committee ranked stories blindly according to the intrigue of their plot, use of language, character description and scientific soundness.

Despite there being more entrants every year, our students did not

disappoint with all three places from the age 12-17 category being from our school:

Year I2 Art Project

Year 12 has been working on a casting project. This has involved responding to the work of the Boyle family who are known for their large scale casts of pathways, kerb stones and other textural surfaces.

The process has involved rolling slabs of clay and taking them outside, laying them flat on drain covers or paving to take an impression. The slabs were then cut into triangles and joined to create large hollow three dimensional shards, we then filled these with plaster. Once dry the clay was removed to reveal solid plaster



shards, decorated with the impressions taken from our immediate environment.

The shards have now been planted around the school and as spring erupts the shrubbery will embed these sculptural pieces into the garden. As the elements take hold, the work will decay and colour.



Photography A Level Trip to London

Tuesday 16th January was a crisp, incredibly cold but sunny day.

Students learn about Judaism

This term all of Year 8 had the opportunity to visit Kingston's Liberal Synagogue. The visit was organised by the RE Department to enhance the learning of Judaism, which is currently being studied.

Learning about other world faiths is a requirement of the Catholic Bishops' curriculum for Religious Education and it helps prepare students for life in a multi-faith Britain.



During the visit, students were able to explore and develop their understanding of the key features of the Synagogue and they also had the chance to attempt to read Hebrew from the Torah scrolls and prayer books.

The guides spoke in detail about Jewish beliefs and practices and gave personal insights on what it is like to be a Jewish believer today, how they worship and what is involved in a Synagogue service.

Students also had the opportunity to ask many questions about Judaism and our guides helped students to appreciate connections between Judaism and Christianity, and they were able to dispel some common misunderstandings about the religion.

On 31st January, the Year 13 English Literature classes went to see Ockham Razor's production of Tess of the D'Urbervilles in London. We loved the unique adaptation using physical theatre to dramatise Hardy's novel. It introduced a different perspective to our favourite scenes through their use of circus, backdrop of projections, and their wielding of wooden planks to evoke the vast landscapes and interior worlds of Hardy's Wessex. Hamnet

Drama students in Years 10, 12 and 13 went to see Lolita Chakrabarti's staging of Maggie O'Farrell's book, Hamnet, which is about the loss of Shakespeare's son and his resurrection in Hamlet.

The trip on a cold January night took us to the beautiful Garrick Theatre, London. Before the performance, we had some time to have dinner and explore Trafalgar Square.

Directed by Erica Whyman, the play itself is about love, trust, loss and all the aspects that make up humanity. It initially focusses on Shakespeare falling in love with his new bride Agnes who is sweet, light-hearted and comedic in many moments. The picturesque



romance of the first half changes dramatically as Agnes goes into a paralysing state of depression and William becomes almost emotionless, as they handle the grief of the death of their young son Hamnet.

William departs from Stratford-upon-Avon to immerse himself in his creative work in London, leaving Agnes and the family in grief. The play climaxes with Agnes movingly discovering that William has written a play to honour their son, Hamlet. As the play progressed, the simple wooden set gradually developed until it resembled the original Globe Theatre where Shakespeare's plays were first performed.

Everyone thoroughly enjoyed the play and found the actors' performance extremely energetic and inspiring. We are now looking forward to planning our Year 10 and 12 live evaluation question for our mocks in the coming weeks.
