Dear Parents and Carers

As we conclude our spring term, it is lovely to have marked Holy Week whilst at school and to have finished with a whole school liturgy for Maundy Thursday. We have spent Lent revisiting our commitment to journeying with Christ as individuals

Year II in the Spotlight

The beginning of September seems like a lifetime ago for our Year 11s, but they were ready to take on the challenge that lay before them. The students have risen admirably and set out a precedent of hard work and determination to achieve the best possible set of results.

During the winter term, they received a revision skills workshop from Mrs Miller who laid out effective revision strategies and key advice for the students. For example, "you will never want to start revising, so you may as well get on with it." The students' reaction to this session was incredible, students and parents alike were showing us flash cards, mind maps and revision timetables as the students gave themselves every opportunity for success. As a result of this preparation, the students' mock results were very promising. During the Mock Results assembly, the students were given some words of wisdom from one of the school's longest serving servants, Mr Power, who stated that "all of you has a brown envelope with your name on it, currently it is blank, you decide what numbers are placed in that envelope." This comforted all students regardless of their mock results.

It has not been all work for the students. There have been several enrichment opportunities. The students have had a talk from the National Citizen Service (NCS) offering them activities during the summer holiday in which they could pick one of three courses: 'Live it' focused on adrenaline fuelled activities; 'Boss it' focused on enterprise opportunities and





'Change it' focused on social change and a call to action.

The students have also been given the chance to play the staff at various events. The Year 11 netball team took on the staff in a lunchtime fixture watched by a large crowd. The wellskilled Year 11s beat the staff in a close fixture by scoring in the final minute of play, much to the crowd's delight. Next up was the Year 11 football team! The crowds were cheering for both teams in the Sports Hall. The game was end to end, attacking and defending, and the Year 11 goalkeeper made lots of saves. However, after a 2-2 deadlock, the staff scored with 30 seconds to go! It was a fantastic match to watch and well done to everyone who participated.

There are many more events lined up for Year 11 but the big one is their prom on Thursday 4th July at Horsley Towers. To help the students select outfits for the memorable evening, the school ran a 'Pre-loved Prom' event. A number of dresses were donated from Becca Jacks in Worplesdon with dresses worth up to £400 and several of our students walked away with new outfits for this event.

A record 164 students have secured their place at Sixth Form with an additional highest number of external applicants. The Sixth Form will be the largest it has ever been, but as planned, St Hilda's is currently undergoing an expansion and a second single

storey will be added, providing more classrooms and plenty of indoor and outdoor study space for the new students.

For some of our Year 11s, the end of the summer term will mark the end of their St Peter's journey as they seek new opportunities at other colleges and Sixth Form schools. A few choices include Godalming College, George Abbot Sixth Form, Guildford College, Woking College and Farnborough Tech.

Whilst we celebrate all our students' achievements, we would like to take the opportunity to mention three students who are pursuing their sporting ambition. Emily 11KO has been given a two year contract to continue playing with Reading Football Club and will complete her studies with them. Conor 11JP has been given a scholarship at Gordon's Sixth Form due to his rugby ability. Morgan 11BA is going to Mount Kelly in Devon to pursue swimming.

It has been a pleasure to get to know such studious and hardworking Year 11s and we wish them the best of luck with their forthcoming exams.

We hope that all of our students who are moving on to pastures new thrive in their new setting and look back at St Peter's with fond memories. For those that are staying, we look forward to seeing them in September, ready for the next exciting chapter!

Parent Survey Feedback

I am pleased to report that 304 people completed the Parent Survey, compared to 430 last year, but it has been very useful to identify a small number of priorities that we will explore to improve the service given to your young people and also, to you as families.

As we normally find, one family's 'gripe' is often on another family's wish list. An example of this is where many people say there is not enough homework whilst others say there is too much. Clearly finding the right balance is the target and as a mainstream school, we are always aiming to provide systems that work for at least the majority, if not everybody. Some feedback references the challenge about understanding the reports that we send home. For a number of years, we have published reports in Years 7, 8 and 9 that use descriptors for progress rather than data such as grades or levels. Despite the fact that we do publish how to interpret these, we have noticed a desire to make it more overt and will endeavour to do so.

We are aiming to review how our school website is structured to enable ease of use and identify commonly used links so they can be accessed more effectively. It appears the content is good but the routes to finding it is not always straightforward. I am pleased that the changes made to communications by sharing a link to the weekly Student Bulletin have proven popular.

The recording and communication of homework is an element of school management that we will also be reviewing. There are a variety of methods to achieve this and we will explore



moving to an electronic process that will enable students and parents to see, monitor and review homework. The challenge will be to identify where we can incorporate this into our current systems to avoid using another login.

Frustrations around sporting fixtures and/ or training cancellations came through from a small number of responses. I would like to reassure parents/carers that sporting activities are never cancelled lightly and like most schools, we are limited by the number of PE staff we have available to lead these activities. If we have a poorly member of the PE Department, there is not another member automatically able to take over as they will almost certainly be taking another group of students. Also, when a team progresses through a competition and fixtures are already published, they very often clash with a training session for another year group. I am sure you will agree that the competition must take priority.

Opportunities for extracurricular involvement has seen a positive impact from the survey results. Two factors have

impacted this including a return to a single lunch which enables more staff to be available to all year groups and secondly, a real drive to increase the number of opportunities both at lunchtime and after school.

We do spend a considerable amount of time reading all the comments and where we can, and it is appropriate, we will act. Thank you for your time in completing the survey.


